



- 1. Q. Please explain what is meant by the "Trucial States", and the stamps issued by them?
- A. The Trucial States are comprised of seven Arab sheikdoms on the Gulf of Persia and the Gulf of Oman. They include, Abu Dhabi, Ajman, Dubai, Fujiera, Ras al Khaima, Sharjah and Dependencies, and Umm al Kiwain. They were under British protection from 1892-1971. Trucial States stamps went on sale in January, 1961, but were declared invalid for postal use from September 30, 1963 on. On the first of January, 1967, postal administration responsibility was transferred to Sheik Zaid of Abu Dhabi, by the British authorities. In 1971, after the British withdrew from the Gulf area, and terminated their treaty with the Trucial States, the seven sheikdoms formed the United Arab Emirates.

Many emerging, independent nations make use of outside philatelic agencies. design, production and distribution is left entirely to an agent, who has not the good of the country, or the collector in mind. These agents control all phases of a nation's stamps. They often issue far more stamps than the country's volume of mail justify, along with long sets, which contain very high face values, which are totally unnecessary. Commemorative stamps are issued with total disregard for the relevancy of the event to the country. Another practice of unscroupulous agents is to issue limited editions of issues, in changed colors - or imperforate, too many souvenir or miniature sheets, and in many instances very few (sometimes none) of these stamps even reach the country whose name they bear. Canceled to order stamps are put on sale at a fraction of the face value. The major portion of the printing is handled and distributed by the agency, and they are never even seen by the residents of these countries. The countries so manipulated all from the emerging nations of Africa, the Trucial States, and countries such as Afghanistan and Shutan.

- 2. Q. What are three of the most commonly used references for stamp information?
- A. The most widely used is "Scott's Standard Postage Stamp Catalogue". Published in five volumes, it lists stamps of the entire world, along with many of the major varieties. One is a specialized catalogue of the United States and Possessions. The other four volumes contain the rest of the world. Another fine reference is "Minkus World Wide Catalogue", published in three volumes, with one volume being U.S. Specialized. These will give the collector a good starting oint for reference, and for further information, philatelic publicions should be consulted.

- 2. Q. (cont'd.) Philatelic publications such as those put out by the American Philatelic Society, The American Topical Association, and other philatelic organizations such as the Society of Philatelic Americans, along with the philatelic newspapers, such as Stamp Collector, Linn's, Stamps Magazine and Mekeels will give you invaluable information. Then there are the publications strictly for the specialist, such as the International Society for Japanese Philately's publication "Japanese Philately", and many others. There are reference materials on practically evey country, both in English and the language of the countries.
- 3. Q. How many pages or frames should you enter in an exhibit?
- A. The number of pages or frames is generally determined by the club putting the exhibit on. This will be established by the number of pages a frame will hold, and how many frames the host club can make available. In shows on a local level, the minimum may be three frames, and the maximum may be ten or twelve. For the NEVPEX show, so far, the minimum number of pages has been twelve, with no maximum limit. Exhibit hall space is also a factor.
- 4. Q. Can you exhibit the same exhibit each year?
- A. Yes, provided it is changed, or added to in some way. This applies to exhibiting in the same show again. If it is to be exhibited in another show, you may do so without changes for the first time only.
- 5. Q. Do you have to put a border on your exhibit pages and frame your stamps?
- A. There is no hard and fast rule that says you must frame your stamps and border your pages. Usually a bordered page looks a little better, provided it isn't overdone. There are many ways of bordering pages besides using lines, which will tie in well with the stamps being exhibited. Framing stamps is another way of "setting them off", just as you would do a painting. Again, don't overdo.

Written by Dorothy Mason, of the BLM's Carson City district office, it traces the trail of the Pony Express in Nevada, which is now permanently marked. Chapters treat General History, Specific History by Site, Other Points of Interest, and Early Events in Nevada which deals with stories and legends surrounding riders and stations. The last chapter, "Before the Pony Express", is devoted to pre-Pony Express history and routes. The back cover folds out, with a map and a complete listing of all stations. ## EXHIBITING

Does it sound too scary? Too much work? Don't know where to start? Maybe this will answer a few questions. It's really fun, when you get right down to researching and working on an exhibit.

First, decide what you want to exhibit, and how you want to present it. Next, make your list of necessary stamps and start accumulating them. Plan the number of pages in your exhibit, and decide on the type of pages you intend to use. Buy what you need, plus some extras, in case of having to re-do any.

Now you're ready to start your research. Use every possible source. Not only philatelic, but anything remotely connected with your particular subject. libraries, museums, newspapers, philatelic publications, historical societies, travel guides, and commercial and trade publications.

Start with the catalogue. BUT use it only as a starting point. (Judges are well aware of the contents of catalogues, and you need much more than that.). Next, go to your library. If you're lucky, (like we in Carson City), your librarians will be happy to get reference information for you through Inter-Library Loan, if they don't already have it. Of course, you'll need book titles, author, and if possible, date of publication. Much of this type of information can be gained through book bibliographies. Another good bibliography source is the Encyclopaedia. Don't overlook anything.

There are a number of ways to correlate your information. Get a small three-ring binder, and use a page, or half-page for each stamp. Jot down any and all information pertaining to your subject. (Some of it you won't use, but that can be weeded out later). Another method is to use a card file, keeping one card for each stamp. You can work our your own most comfortable method.

With all your research finished (is it ever?) assemble your information, then weed out every bit of extraneous matter. Now, where to go?

As suggested in a number of publications, I like to write the Title page first, then plan the final page, and do the body of the exhibit last.

Now dummies. No, that's not a personal comment. It merely means to dummy up pages, before attempting to touch an exhibit page. This is a little extra work, but it pays off in the long run. Buy a package of cheap typing paper, lay out your stamps, draw the frames around them and plan your typing or printing on these pages. This will give you the general appearance of the finished page. At the same time, keep in mind, the adjacent

pages. You will be looking at each page as a unit, as well as the "overall" effect. A good test is to lay your pages out in sequence, as you go along, on a large table, or the floor. Do, and redo these dummies until you have what you want in a finished exhibit page. If typing or lettering doesn't come up to your expectations, just redo that portion. Perhaps you don't like the positioning of the stamps. Frames can easily be redrawn and moved on dummies. But, if you're working on your final pages, you'll waste time and pages. Check for spelling and typing errors, and note all necessary corrections. Now, you are ready for your exhibit pages.

Always keep in mind the following: MAKE IT CLEAR - MAKE IT CONCISE - MAKE IT COMPLETE - MAKE IT CORRECT.

There are many good books on preparing stamp exhibits. My own particular preference is "How to Prepare Stamp Exhibits" by C.E. Foster. It can be obtained from your stamp dealer, and is very reasonable. It can be purchased in a number of ways. There is a bound library edition - \$21.00, plastic spiral spine - \$12.00, paperback - \$10.50, and unbound - \$9.00.

If you're really interested in exhibiting, this book is a must. It covers every phase of exhibiting in great detail. There are 18 chapters. A few of the subjects covered are: Planning, Tools Needed, Pages, Layout, Lettering, Illustrating, Typing, How to Mount, Framing, What Constitutes a Good Exhibit, Developing a Story, and much much more. This is a book which will be of great value to you for years to come. (It's my bible)!

limited printing of 50,000. In addition, signed and numbered prints (6½" x 9") will be offered through reputable art dealers.
