JAMAICA LAST CENTURY

This information was provided by Malcolm Watts, dealer and collector from Great Britain. The information is old but should be of interest to those of the West Indie preference.

When adhesives were first issued in Britain, the Deputy PMG at Kingston was John Wilson with a salary of 400 lbs. At this time no other post office was mentioned in the 'Blue Blook' for 1840. In 1844 a list is given for the first time of theoffices in the island. Fifty offices are listed in 1858, differing from the London list by omitting Ewarton and Little River but including Clarendon, Dry Harbour, Flint River, Gagle, Port Royal andPorus. This local list is the much more trustworthy, as it came out over the signature of Wilson's successor, O'Connor Morris. Outside Kingston, Falmouth, Montego Bay and Savannah were themost important offices.

Jamaica had to take over the management of its ownpostal affairs in 1860. This was largely due to the work of Anthony Trollope, who visited the West Indies to examine the matter on the spot. It was his recommendations that certain postal operations be transferred to Jamaica. It was on August 1, 1860, that Jamaica began its own postal system. In fact, the London PMG stated that from thisdate no colonial post office was under his jurisdiction except those at the military stations of Gibraltar and Malta.

In 1847 the post to the country districts was increased to two each, and in 1868 it became three for some years although many thoughtthat once a week was ample! The mails went manily by stage coack since the railway did not cover the island until the 90's. Only Kingston had a house-to-house delivery, and letters had to be called for at the other offices. Few Jamaicans could read and write, at this time. If a letter was not colled for by one month it was returned to the sender.

In mid-1868 Jamaica brought into force post office regulations based on those ruling in the UK. One of the rules required the postmaster to pay 2d for each letter from abroad, 1d if the letter came from UK. The postmaster paid the fee to the master of the inbound vessel.

The cancellation for Kingston was A01, which was changed in 1885, and A75 appeared. During this time cancels A28 to A78 were used. A38, A50 and A63 were not used in Jamaica. This practice of the use of these numbered cancels disappeared from 1889 to May 1891. May 1891 is the last known cancel, which was used t Spanish Town, Jamaica.

Most of these cancels are listed in the Gibbons Catalog and one could make quite a study and collection of the enumerous amount of the UK cancels.

St. Lucia happens to be All. Which by the way, counterfeits are known to exist. Iam sure that counterfeits exist on many of the other colonial cancel.



POSTAL SERVICE TO OFFER OLYMPIC TORCH COMMEMORATIVE CANCELLATIONS

The U.S. Postal Service today announced that it will establish temporary postal stations and provide pictorial cancellations at 41 cities along the Olympic Torch Relay route.

The relay, a long-standing Olympic tradition, will begin on May 8 in New York City, after the Olympic Torch is transmitted electronically from Greece, the site of the original Olympic Games. From New York, 10,000 relay runners will alternate carrying the torch on a 9,000 mile, 33-state, cross-country journey to Los Angeles, the site of this year's Summer Games.

The postmarks to be used along the relay route are identical in design except for the dates, cities and ZIP Codes. A reproduction of the design, which was executed by Rudolph de Harak & Associates of New York City, is shown below:

"The route will take the flame through every possible environment in the United States," said Joel Fishman, the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee director for the Olympic Torch Relay. "It will go over mountains, through deserts, across rivers, along oceans and through 41 of the Nation's largest cities."

Cancellations will be available both by mail order and on a handback basis at temporary stations, as well ___ at the Main Post Offices in each of the 41 cities listed below:

Mail Orders from Individual Post Offices: Envelopes, post cards, postal cards and U.S. aerogrammes addressed to "Postmaster, Olympic Torch Cancellations, City and ZIP Code" may be mailed to each of the 41 cities. All items must be addressed and must bear the minimum applicable postage for delivery to domestic or foreign addresses. Non-mailable items will not be accepted for cancellation by mail order. They will, however, be canceled on a handback basis in each city, if they bear at least minimum First-Class postage. Orders are limited to 50 cancellations per customer. Persons wishing to obtain more than 50 Olympic Torch cancellations per city should obtain prior authorization from the Stamps Division at (202) 245-4956.

No stamps will be affixed by the Postal Service, and no remittance for stamps will be accepted. Stamps must be affixed by customers in the upper right corner of the item, approximately one quarter inch from the right edge. A filler of postal card thickness should be inserted in envelopes. Orders must be received no later than the day of the cancellation for each city.

Due to the limited period of time before the start of the Torch Relay, the Postal Service will make available in each city a limited number of 13-cent Olympic Torch postal cards which will be canceled with the Olympic Torch Relay cancellation. The cost will be 13 cents for each postal card and a stamped self-addressed envelope should accompany each request. Customers can obtain the postal cards by writing to "Olympic Torch Postal Card Cancellations,"

Postmaster, City and ZIP Code-9992."

The postal cards also can be obtained by mail order from the Philatelic Sales Division by writing to "Olympic Torch Postal Card Cancellations, Philatelic Sales Division, Washington, D.C. 20265-9997." The cost is 13 cents per cancellation plus 50 cents postage and handling for each order. More than one cancellation can be requested per order, but customers should specify the city and date of each cancellation desired. Orders will be filled while supplies last.

In addition, the entire set of 41 canceled postal cards can be obtained by mail order by writing to "Olympic Torch Postal Card Cancellations Set, Philatelic Saler Diminion Mashington, D.C. 20265-9997." The cost is \$5.33 plus 50 cents for postage and handling. Orders will be filled while supplies last.
