With the Statue of Liberty in the news lately, collectors might be interested in a little history about this immense piece of art sculpture.

The striking presentation of the head of the Statue of Liberty on the 17¢ U.S. air post stamp(C80) represents the world's first view of this famous symbol of Franco-American friendship. This may be not be generally realized since few people have actually seen the head of the statute this close up before.

However, eight years before the statue was erected on Bedloe's Island in New York Harbor, the completed head of Liberty had its first public viewing at the Paris Exhibition during the summer of 1878.

Frederic Auguste Bartholdi, an Alsatian sculptor, conceived the gargantuan representation of Liberty at the entrance to New York Harbor during a visit to America in 1871.

After making a model 36 feet high, Bartholdi began the task of forming the copper sheets to be riveted together to form the heroic figure he had conceived.

This work began in 1874 and by 1878 he had finsihed the head of Liberty, which measures 17 feet 2 inches from chin to cranium and is 10 feet breadth. Displayed at the Paris Exhibition it attracted much attention and inspired the last subscriptions to the funds to make possible its presentation to the United States as a gift of the French people.

There is a tradition that the sculptor's mother was the model for Liberty.

In the planning of his heroic conception Bartholdi worked closely with the French engineer Gustave Eiffel (creator of the famous "Tower" who designed the framework of steel girders which support the copper plates of the figure.

Bartholdi completed his work on the statue in 1884 and it was shipped to the United States in 214 packing cases early in the following year for erection on the pedestal whose construction on Bedloe's Island was financed by popular subscription in the United States. It was dedicated in 1886 by President Grover Cleveland.

The Statue of Liberty, which is 151 feet in height, exclusive of the pedestal on which it is mounted, and weighs 225 tons, stands on what has been known as Liberty Island since 1956. It is a National Monument administered by the National Park Service.

It was first pictured on the U.S. postal paper on the 15¢ denomination of the 1922 definitive series (Nos 566 and 696). In 1940 it was the subject of the 1¢ value (No. 899) of the National Defense series. Its use as the subject for 3¢, 8¢ and 11¢ denominations of the 1954-68 U.S. definitive series is the reason why this is popularly known as the Liberty Issue. Enlarged reproductions of the 3¢ and 8¢ "Liberty" definitives appear on the souvenir sheet (No. 1075) issued in 1956 for the Fifth International Philatelic Exhibition.

The current 17¢ is the fourth U.S. air post stamp to show the Statue of Liberty. It is in the foreground of the view of New York on the 15¢ (No. C35) issued in 1947 and its upper portion is shown on 15¢ airs (Nos. C58 and C63) issued in 1959 and 1961. Bur the current 17¢, with its view of the head of Liberty first viewed by the public 93 years ago is Paris is one of the most dramatic presentations of the famous statue on postal paper.

The Lady is receiving its first cleaning these days in preparation for its birthday party in 1986. There should be some new issues depicting Liberty in that year. Also many, many cachets will be made for this event. It will be one to look forward to philately speaking.
