In my mail, recently, was a letter from Jessie Rogers, along with an article concerning stamp collecting. It was in letter form from the "Gifted Childrens Monthly". It was written by Judy Sizemore, from Rockholds, KY. It was headlined "Stamp Collecting Expands Their World". Here are an excerpt from that letter.

Stamps, those colorful bits of paper that move the mail, can also fire a child's imagination, make them curious about geography, history, science, and countless other subjects. In just the last month, my 7-year-old daughter Robin has learned when Apollo VIII tooke the first men into lunar orbit, who Frederick Douglass was, and where the tiny country of Rwanda is located.

Robin started collecting stamps when she was 5. She now has over 2,000 stamps, but it's not the stamps themselves that are important, it's the knowledge she has gained from her hobby that matters. For instance, she's learned to use an atlas. Whenever she gets a new foreign stamp, she checks location, area and population of the country where the stamps were issued. She takes special delight in finding stamps from very small countries. Robin has also learned to use an encyclopedia to find out more about the people and places pictured on the stamps.

Getting Robin interested in stamp collecting was easy. Sticker collecting is the rage in grade schools these days. When I suggested stamp collecting as a more sophisticated alternative, she was instantly hooked.

I very nearly destroyed her burgeoning interest, however, when I tried to teach her the "right" way to take care of her collection, that is, the recommended way to handle stamps. Mounting them with hinges is not very easy for a young child. Robin kept them in labled envelopes, a simple way at the time. Later, plastic sheets replaced the envelopes and were perfect for holding the stamps.

The above letter or portions of it, clearly show how you may help your child or grandchild develop a taste for stamp collecting.
