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CONVENTION NOTES

I'm not certain I can make it to a meeting in January, so I thought I'd report on my trip to New Jersey, taken in October. On October 11, 12 and 13 the American First Day Cover Society held its 31st annual convention and show in Morristown. Discovering that I was elgible to fly anywhere in the U.S. for free if I went via military "space available" cargo planes, I decided to attend this big convention in New Jersey.

I had two goals: 1. Show my cover collection at an all-cover show where knowledgable FDC judges would appreciate (I hoped)my efforts, and 2. Meet face-to-face the big name people in the AFDCS I had been reading about for several years.

Even though the physical aspects of the trip were sometimes rather grueling (I'll never travel that way again!), I did reach my goals and had a very good time while I was actually at the convention.

My cover collection "Who Said That? An American Literature Review" was given a Silver award. I was thrilled! All my research attempts and reworking of album pages paid off. For me this is the most satisfying aspect of the hobby — exhibiting. An unlooked-for bonus came in the form of a personal and private judges critique of my collection. Thirty minutes before I had to leave to come home, two judges just happened to be standing near my exhibit and were pleasantly willing to let me"pick their brains". (The officially scheduled Critique session was not to be done until the last day of the show, and I would have missed it.)

The "people" part of the show was super too. First of all, I was invited to stay at the home of THE Executive Director of the society, Sol Koved, and also borrowed his car to commute to and from the show. If that wasn't special "red carpet" treatment enough, I was also personally introduced by Sol to several other important

NAMES in the society. Richard Monty, the Executive Vice President, was asked by Sol to interview me for an article in FIRST DAYS, our society journal. It was all pretty exciting for this California country girl. I never really did figure out why I should get all this attention, unless it was based on the way I traveled to get there. I sure wasn't because I'm a cachet-maker; there were hundreds of those attending the convention!

The special speakers and meetings were fascinating and the exhibits were terrific, but it was the people I met and talked with that made the whole trip worthwhile. One couple in particular became "life savers" after the convention was over. Ham and Dot McNatt chatted with me for quite awhile on Saturday, and discovered that the Air Force Base at Dover, Delaware was where my cargo flight landed. It developed that they lived only 15 miles from there. Unfortunately, my scheduled flight home was to leave at 5 am Sunday, long before the show would end and they would be driving home. As it turned out, my flight was delayed. At 3 pm Sunday I was sitting in the passenger terminal, waiting, when in walk Ham and Dot -- checking to see if I had got my flight out okay. When they learned that the flight was delayed for an indefinite time, they took me home with them to Milford, Delaware. I ended up as their guest until Tuesday at 9 am! What wonderful luck to have met such warm and welcoming people so far from home.

Ham McNatt is a cachet-maker of good reputation. His cachets are hand-drawn and hand painted, and show a unique sense of humor. He got into this activity strictly as an artist, and has very little philatelic knowledge or interest, but has a strong following of collectors nevertheless. He asks for and gets \$25 per cover! I feel honored to have "brushed shoulders" with this artist. ... This Christmas he sent me the cover shown below, and the accompanying note.




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
