Exhibiting is creeping into my blood; the more I do it, the more I want to do ... more. After winning a silver at the AFDCS convention in New Jersey last Fall, I was eager to try again with the same exhibit. I wanted to see what different results come from a different panel of judges. I entered the competition at PINEPEX '87 held in El Sobrante on Jan. 30 & Feb. 1.

PINEPEX was the eleventh annual show put on by the San Pablo Pines Stamp Club. Their shows are small, but well attended. The twelve dealers certainly were busy Saturday morning, and the parking lot was full right away. The atmosphere was pleasantly

noisy and bustling.

In addition to exhibiting, I wanted to attend the local chapter meeting of the AFDCS. I saw lots of familiar faces, including Leon and Lillian Rahe, who always try to come to NEVPEX.

The show was to feature seventeen exhibitors, according to the program, but two failed to arrive. There were several empty frames because of this, and some effort was made to fill them with non-competitive exhibits at the last minute. (Sound familiar?) Here is what was shown and what awards were earned:

Before judging was completed, I made notes on my program to show the types of exhibits --

s = serious effort showing some philatelic research

* My code: nc = no philatelic comments, purely topical

a = album pages commercially printed

The panel of judges included Wayne Menuz, Clell McElroy, King Parker (apprentice), and our own Bill Oliver, Chairman. In the afternoon Bill Oliver talked with me about the exhibits. We discussed the "big frog in a little pond" (my expression) idea: a grand award winner here might come away with much less at a bigger more serious show. Merit judging is predominant regardless of show size, but the human element can't be kept out. The judges do walk through and get a "feel" for the show as a whole before getting down to analysis of individual efforts. ... The following views are my own, not Bill Oliver's ---

The Grand Award winner presented what I call serious classical material that featured some "fly-specking." Boring to me, but to

each his own.

Three exhibits were mounted on ready-made pages. I consider those types to be "no-brainers" because all they had to do was fill in the squares. (How much trouble will I be in for that?!) Two received awards. They were attractive and clean and neat and informative. Using this type of album page is certainly

better than hiding stamps away in a box.

"Domestic Postal Issues of 1980's" caught my eye immediately. It had all long (#10) commercial type covers with various bulk rate and pre-cancel stamps --- in other words, "junk mail"! The exhibitor said he wanted to prove that he could create a fun and attractive exhibit without any philatelic expense. It was all unsolicited genuine mail delivered to his home. He mounted each cover one to a page on the diagonal. The thing that probably earned him a Silver award was his concise, neatly typed comments about each stamp issue used.


Of the four exhibits without philatelic commentary, one was given an Honorable Mention and one received a Silver award. The "Great White Fleet" was a small but interesting collection of old post cards picturing the Philappines and ships stationed there. The "World of Women" was very familiar; it's been to many of the shows I've seen. I think it may have been given a Silver because of the great amount of biographical research shown, and possibly because the general lay-out has improved over time. I think it would probably not earn more than a Bronze in most shows because of an excess of words and a lack of philatelic comment.

The "History of Zeppelins" had some interesting material, but I think the major flaw was not having an introduction/title page. This lack caused confusion: what was the exhibitor trying to show? was it all there? Several people were seen trying to find the beginning by looking around to the other side of the first frame.

My own exhibit, "Who Said That? An American Literature Review" earned a Gold and the ATA special award mainly because of format, I believe. I certainly don't have anything rare or difficult to acquire, and only about ; of my material had any philatelic notes.

I have to admit, in spite of all my rational protestations about this show being judged "high", it's still a thrill to get an award better than previously awarded. All "pats on the back" are more than welcome.


To sum up -- every show gives a chance to learn, to share opinions, to buy new material, and renew friendships. This show gave all these pleasures "tenfold". I had a difficult time breaking away when it was time to head homeward. I left an hour and a half later than I had intended, and had to break off in the middle of a three-way conversation when I finally did leave. I was at the show from 10:30 am to 3:30 pm, and loved every minute.

The show souvenir cover featured the ferry system of San Francisco Bay. It, and the special cancel were designed by John Grosvenor.


