Installation of officers and a pot-luck luncheon will be held at our regular meeting on Saturday, August 8. Starting at 1:30 pm. More on this from Ruthe.


WARM WELCOME to new members Deloris and Julie Gianopulos, U.S. collectors. Jump right in !


An Episode Of Fiddletown

(TO COMMEMORATE the 150th anniversary of the birth of Francis Bret Harte, celebrated author of literary classics with a Californian regional setting, QUINTESSENCE PUBLICATIONS is pleased to announce its publication of the first separate book publication of Harte's incomparable AN EPISODE OF FIDDLETOWN.


This first separate edition of AN EPISODE OF FIDDLETOWN will be beautifully hard bound in an edition limited to 500 copies, 25 of which will bear the special cancellation, "First Day of Issue," of one of the new \$5 United States Postal Service's Bret Harte commemorative stamps to be issued in Twain-Harte, California, in August of 1986.

THE TYPES for the limited edition of AN EPI-SODE OF FIDDLETOWN have been completely re-set in the highly appropriate face of "El Dorado," a rare face cut in 1951 by the eminent American type designer, W. A. Dwigins. AN EPISODE OF FIDDLETOWN is set in 12-point El Dorado (as is this prospectus), a "black" face with the rough-cut nature of California's Mother Lode where Harte's story is set. Fiddletown is located in Amador County—not far om the Quintessence Publications press-room.

Here is a copy of part of an advertising flier circulated in Amador County (CA) last year when a local printer decided to capitalize on the timely issue of the \$5 Bret Harte stamp. Imagine his dismay when availability of the stamp was postponed a year! He did go ahead and print the books, however, and changed his advertising and order forms, omitting any mention of the stamp.

I saved my copies of this flier in order to make them into FDOI esoterica. "Esoterica", as defined by T. Michael Weddle of the AFDCS, "includes any item that has been FIRST DAY cancelled that doesn't fit any of the regular collecting categories."

The folded flier can be held sideways and a stamp applied thus:




Here's where the stamp is mentioned with the wrong issue date in 1986.

If timing is lucky, I can go to Fiddletown the same day and add a regular 22¢ stamp to be cancelled there, making this a combonation FDC and unofficial FDC piece of esoterica.
