FROM BILL BREW:

Picture, if you can, a young man in his thirties, dressed in a black beret, wearing a moth-eaten, well worn, pair of trousers and on his feet, a pair of shoes having rope for soles. This was in the late 1800s and into the early 1900s.

A stamp collector, you say?

Not by appearances. Well, with today's prices!!!! But, appearances are deceiving.

This man was obsessed with the idea that he had to have one of every stamp issued by every country in the world. Which, by the way, included the British Cuiana 1¢ magenta, the most famous stamp of all. He traveled exclusively throughout the world, buying here and buying there. A dealer's bluebird of happiness.

He had almost completed his dream until he ran into the many issues that were put on the market by the India States and by those in South Australia.

This man was Count Philip la Renotiere von Farrary. As heir to millions, he had plenty of money with which he could satisfy his wants for stamps. Two full-time clerks assisted him in assorting and arranging his collection. He was known to spend as much as \$10,000 per week for his purchases. His entire life was dedicated to this one goal. He died in 1917, as the story goes, on his way back to the hotel, after meeting with a stamp dealer.

Today, as it was then, it is impossible for a person to accumulate every stamp issued by every country. Well, if you had the money and an extensive staff, you might come close. But, it is like keeping up with inflation. You almost reach the point where your intake matches your outgo, then a new expense is added.

Philatelist's Psalm Stamp collecting is my hobby, I shall not be bore ϑ . It maketh me to do research on far places. It causeth me to correspond with odd people. It keepeth me alert. It leadeth me into areas of understanding for curiosity's sake. Yea, though I live through a Winter of inclement weather, I will fear no boredom, for my stamps are with me. They provideth me a means of escaping from the tensions of my responsibilities. Chey filleth my house with books. My cash runneth lower. Surely interest and knowledge shall follow me all the days of my life.

And I will be listed in the ranks of the Philatelists forever.

ABOUT TWO YEARS AGO, AN ARTICLE BY BILL WELCH, THE EDITOR, DEALT WITH THE PRINTING OF THE FIRST KNOWN STAMP ALBUM IN THE UNITED STATES, IN 1863 BY A MAN NAMED APPLETON. HOW MANY WERE PRINTED IS UNKNOWN, BUT IT WENT ON TO SAY SEVEN WERE KNOWN. HE HAS ONE, ONE IS IN THE SMITHSONIAN AND FIVE OTHERS. THIS MADE SOME BELLS RING SO DOWN TO MY SAFETY DEPOSIT BOX TO BRING HOM MY OLD ALBUM. THEN I WROTE BILL, SAYING I KNEW WHERE AN EIGHTH IS. WITH A COUPLE OF LETTERS EXCHANGED, HE SAID HE WOULD BE AT OUR 1988 NEVPEX SHOW AND WOULD LIKE TO SEE IT.

IT WAS A VERY INTERESTING COUPLE OF HOURS IS SPENT WITH HIM, LIKE OTHERS, ALL STAMPS ARE PASTED IN AND MOST IN POOR CONDITION, BUT HIS COMMENT WAS THAT MY ALBUM WAS IN BETTER SHAPE THAN MOST. A COUPLE HAVF HAD THE STAMPS REMOVED. HE WENT ON TO FIND MINOR FLAWS IN THE PRINTING, MAPS, THINGS I HAD NEVER NOTICED BUT HE SAID THEY WERE TRUE OF EACH ALBUM HE HAD SEEN, ALSO A COUPLE MORE HAD SURFACES THAT HE HOPED TO LOOK AT AND THE END RESULT OF THE ARTICLE, THAT TWO-FIFTY PAGE PLAIN ALBUMS WERE PUT OUT IN 1862 BY APPLETON HAD SURFACED AND DEEMED TO BE AUTHENTIC, THUS CAUSING US WITH 1863 ALBUMS TO LOSE THE DISTINCTION OF OWNING THE OLDEST KNOWN U.S. ALBUMS.

MY GRANDFATHER, BORN IN 1850 PUT THIS ALBUM TOGETHER AS A
BOY BUT TOLD ME HE LOST INTEREST BUT SAVED IT FOR HIS FIRST GRANDCHILD
THAT SHOWED AN INTEREST IN STAMPS AND GAVE IT TO ME IN THE 1920'S. I DID
A COUPLE OF THINGS WRONG IN IT BUT AM THANKFUL MY DAD MADE ME PUT IT AWAY
UNTIL I WAS OLDER AND COULD HANDLE IT PROPERLY AND BOUGHT ME AN ALBUM I
COULD CALL MY OWN. I HAVE HAD THE OLD ALBUM TO A COUPLE OF MEETINGS SO
A FEW HAVE SEEN IT AND I WILL BRING IT AGAIN IF ANYONE WISHES, BUT HESITATE
TO PASS IT AROUND. FOR ME IT A FUN THING TO GO THRU AND STUDY OCCASIONALLY

THANX WALT, I FIND THAT MOST INTERESTING AND THINK THE MEMBERS WOULD LIKE TO SEE IT - CHECK WITH ME FOR A FUTURE DATE, WE WILL BUILD A PROGRAM AROUND IT AND POSSIBLY OTHER OLD ITEMS.....

1931 - 1934


Departed Boston, Massachusetts, 2 July 1931. Commander Louis J. Gulliver in command. She covered the entire coast line of the United States, from Maine to Texas and than California to Puget Sound, Washington. She visited seventy-five different ports including Guantanamo Bay and the Panama Canal Zone. She was decommissioned on 8 June 1934 with a total of 4,647,578 visitors having walked her decks.

All covers cancelled from ports visited prior to 10 September 1931 had the local post office cancel. These were all Type #6 hand cancel or Type #7 machine cancel.

Only a very few registered covers with the Type #9v cancel were issued 19 October 1931. There were many Crosby photographic covers issued with three different type photos. Old Ironsides had many type cancel's and also of many colors.




