PREXY FDCs -- NUMBERS THAT BOGGLE THE MIND

For the last few years I've pretty much specialized and limited my collecting interests to First Day Covers of the 1938 Presidential Series (also called the "Prexy" series and/or the Fifth Bureau Issue).

This sounds simple and not too overwhelming until you start to crunch through the numbers. The set consists of 32 different face values, 1/2 cent through five dollars. One FDC with each stamp would make a collection of 32 covers worth maybe \$200 - \$300, with the top three values comprising 75% of the total worth.

A specialized collector searches for all possible varieties, however, and that's where the fun starts. The original 32 different grows to 78 after you add in the \$1 reprint of 1954, the three booklet pane varieties, the 13 horizontal and vertical coil varieties, and the 29 lower values issued in the experimental electric eye format. A group of FDCs with one of each of these varieties could have a value of maybe \$600 - \$700. Hang onto your calculator -- we've barely started!

Serious specialists in FDC collecting also look for as many different cachet varieties as possible. The Planty catalog identifies 104 different cachets designed for this series. I have found another 10 - 20 cachets not listed in the Planty catalog. By multiplying 78 stamp varieties times 120 different cachets designs, a total of 9,360 different FDC varieties could be possible to find (if every variety was used/mounted on a FDC).

Serious FDC collectors can also look for as many different cancel varieties as possible. The three most common cancel varieties for this Issue are the FDOI machine cancel, the Washington DC circular hand cancel with killer bars, and the Benjamin Franklin station circular hand cancel with killer bars. If each of the 9,360 varieties of FDC mentioned above could be found in combination with these three different cancels, it would be possible to end up with 28,080 different FDC varieties.

What if the collector wants FDCs showing pairs of stamps, blocks, and plate number blocks, in addition to the singles already counted above? Four stamp layout formats times 28,080 equals 112,320 possible FDC varieties!

Ready to give up yet? Hang on to your seats -- we're still flying! To the 112,320 FDCs counted so far, you can add (or multiply) these possible variations:

- Several different killer bar lengths are common on the hand cancels.
- 2. Unofficial cancels from other cities, and Washington DC cancels with different hourly times are not scarce.
- 3. Combination FDCs featuring other stamps on the same cover with the Prexy stamps are not common, but can be found for most values.
- 4. Plate number blocks with the numbers in different positions are not too hard to find for most values. (The \$5 plate block FDCs have been known to sell for \$300 \$500 each.)

- 5. Many envelope sizes and varieties exist for most values. This can include regular and airmail size numbers 5, 6, 6 1/2, 9, and 10. The Linprint cachet can be found on envelopes with either a rounded or pointed flap. The Neare Buckey Stamp Co. cachet exists on seven different pastel envelope colors.
- 6. Uncacheted FDCs of this issue are easy to find, and cachets can be added on by modern artists. This makes the cachet varieties virtually limitless.
- 7. Rubber stamp cachets and printed general purpose cachets are not scarce for this issue, either.
- 8. Plate number strips, plate blocks of six and eight, plate number singles, etc. are very hard to find, but do exist.

You can see from this listing that there are well over ONE MILLION different FDC varieties for this one series of stamps. Issued more than 50 years ago, they have selling prices from \$1 to over \$300 each. I've been collecting seriously five or six years and still have fewer than 15,000 different samples.

I can look forward to a lifetime of searching, spending and FUN while collecting FDCs from Just ONE set of U.S. stamps. ---Whew!
