## Month dedicated to promoting hobby

Journey to a New Frontier —Collect Stamps! is the theme of this year's 11th annual National Stamp Collecting Month in October. As part of the promotion, the Postal Service will issue a booklet of ten 29-cent stamps featuring the nine planets which orbit the sun, plus the Earth's moon and one of the spacecraft that journeyed to them, with the exception of Pluto, which has not yet been explored.

Depicted on the stamps are the Mariner 10 approaching Mercury's orbit; Mariner 2 encircling Venus; Landsat floating above the Earth; Lunar Orbiter exploring the Moon; Viking Orbiter hurling toward Mars; Pioneer 11 collecting data from Jupiter, Voyager 2 photographing Saturn's halo of glowing rings and studying blue Uranus and Neptune; and a solitary Pluto.

Postmaster General Anthony M. Frank will dedicate the stamps during the first day of issue ceremony October 1 at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California.

The Postal Service will be joined by five sponsors: the Benjamin Franklin Stamp Clubs; the Council of Philatelic Organizations; the American Library Association; the Girl Scouts of the United States of America; and the National Association of Elementary School Principals.

"Stamp collecting is the world's most popular hobby," says Gordon C. Morison, assistant postmaster general.


The Postal Service has authorized a pictorial first day of issue postmark, a National Stamp Collecting Month pictorial postmark, and a special cancellation to highlight National Stamp Collecting Month.

Customers have 30 days to obtain the first day of issue postmark by mail. The easiest way is to purchase the Space Exploration stamps at your local post office, affix the stamps to envelopes, address the envelopes to yourself or others, insert a card of postcard thickness, tuck in the flap, place the envelopes in a larger envelope addressed (all capitals and no punctuation preferred except the hyphen in the ZIP+4 code) to SPACE EXPLORATION STAMPS, POSTMASTER, 600 LINCOLN AVE., PASADENA CA 91109-9992. Orders must be postmarked by October 31.

## This new commemorative series is no joke

A series of commemorative postage stamps, the first-ever of its kind honoring famous Hollywood comedians, were launched at a special ceremony in Hollywood. U.S. Postmaster General Anthony Frank dedicated the stamp series honoring Laurel and Hardy, Abbott and Costello, Jack Benny, Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, and Fanny Brice.

Designed by veteran New York Times theatrical caricaturist Al Hirschfeld, 88, the 29-cent stamps

were given their send-off in front of Mann's Chinese Theatre where descendants of the comedians honored were serenaded by the Hollywood High School band and speeches by various dignitaries.

Attending the program was Larry Harmon, creator of television's *Bozo*, who originated the stamp idea and championed its success by chairing, for the past five years, a celebrity commemorative stamp commit-

tee. Harmon's company has owned worldwide rights to the Laurel and Hardy characters for the past 30 years.
