who lives in Anacortes, Wash. She did, and not one, but 50. Mallary's watercolors of U.S. wildflowers are scheduled to be issued Friday as a series of 29-cent stamps. Mallary, 54, said that once she thought she could try postage stamp design, she wrote to the citizens stamp advisory committee of the U.S.

Postal Service. The wildflower series took four years. A design committee had to approve each stamp. One year, 1990, was lost to a debate over postal-rate increases. She wouldn't say how much she is getting paid.
