METHODS OF PRINTING STAMPS

Throughout the stamp catalogues, whether it be a Scott, Gibbons, Minkus or any number of others, the stamps described therein are usually indicated as "Engraved", "Typographed", "Lithographed", "Offset" or "Embossed". Some knowledge of the various processes by which stamps are printed is therefore necessary for all collectors whether he be a beginner or advanced and yet, it is quite remarkable how few stamp collectors are familiar with the printing processes and have the ability to distinguish between a stamp printed by one method or another.

If one collects 20th century United States, he needs to know the difference between a line-engraved and a lithographed stamp, if he is to be able to distinguish between the 1917-19 1ϕ to 3ϕ , from the same values of the issues of 1918-20. The collector who is interested in the early issues of Egypt must be able to separate the typographed printings of 1872 from the lithographed stamps with an identical design issued the very same year.

An understanding of the printing processes explains the occurrence of many of the varieties with certain issues and furthermore enables one to understand why some varieties are of significance while others are of relatively little philatelic importance.

The study of various methods of stamp production is an important phase of philately and once understood, can be a source of continued interest.

PRINTING METHODS

There are four methods by which practically all stamps issued thus far have been printed.

1. Line-Engraving or Intaglio

- Typography (letterpress; Surface-Printing)
- 3. Lithography (Planography)
- 4. Embossing

1. ENGRAVING OR INTAGLIO

This method is technically known as copper-plate printing due to copper being the first metal used in the printing of engraving. This was the first method used in the production of postage stamps with the first stamps of Great Britian in 1840, being printed by this technique. With but few exceptions, this process has been used for the production of United States stamps from the very earliest issues until the present. It has also been the medium of choice for reproduction of printed paper money and other valuable securities.

The actual process is as follows: First, the adopted design is engraved in reverse on a slab of softened steel by the engraver.
