At the General Meeting on April 25, Cindy Scott presented a one frame display and explained the method of showing at various competitive stamp shows. Her exhibit was on Authors and has been entered into several shows. She gave a lot of hints on how to arrange your exhibit and several points to consider that would please the judges. Cindy explained the standards that judges use in judging the exhibits. It was a very interesting and informative program after which she answered the many questions that were given to her.

This was followed by a silent auction. This was the first time a silent auction was held as part of our monthly program and there will be more in the next few months. NSSS hopes that the members will participate in it and that the silent auction will be successful.

Here is a little more information on the "Father of the U.S.Postage Stamps." This report seemed to generate some controversy. So, from the book "The Foundations of Philately," by Winthrop S. Boggs, here is some detailed information. "The Foundations of Philately," is the official handbook of the Philatelic Foundation. It is a complete encyclopedia of philately.

Barnabas Bates is considered the Rowland Hill of American. He was successful of generating postal reforms with an article in *Hunt's Magazine* for March 1840. It was entitled "Post Office Reform, Cheap Postage". He and his associates continuously worked to bring about a change similar to the Postal System in England. Finally on June 10, 1840, Senator Daniel Webster of Massachusetts submitted two resolutions to the Senate relative to reducing the rates of postage and the Introduction of Postage Stamps.

The Postal reform act on March 3, 1845, effective July 1, 1845 was passed. Postmaster General Robert H. Morris, the Postmaster General of New York, experimented with a 5 cent adhesive stamp. Several other P.M.s tried their testing of adhesive stamps. None, as far as the records show had direct sanction of the U.S. Postmaster General.

On March 3, 1847 an Act was passed by Congress. This act authorized the Postmaster General to prepare postage stamps. This Postal Act of March 3, 1847 was signed into effect by President James K. Polk, who was President from 1844 to 1848.

I realize Pres. James K Polk is not mentioned in the history of the introduction of postal stamp adhesives, but there are the facts. He was president and he signed the bill.

By the way it took nine ballots before Polk was nominated by the Democratic Party. He beat out the favorite Martin Van Buren. He is also known as being the first dark horse nominee in American Politics.



Tonga is an interesting group of islands located in the southwest Pacific, to the east of the Fiji Islands. It was first discovered by the Dutch in 1616 and later by Captain James Cook, in 1777 and 1779. Their language was not written until the 19th century. By oral conversation, it seems that the Tonga Islands have been inhabited as far back as the ninth century. It was granted independence Britain in 1970. Its major export is petroleum, with bananas and coconut products chief crops.

Tonga issues a large number of exotic stamps. Some represent their chief crops, such as, the bananas. It issues stamps in various shapes, designs and different types of backing. Metal is one of the their unusual printing base. On page 4 there are several examples of their issues. The cover is from Niuafoou Island and it is dispatched by canoe to the ship. The Tin Can refers to the container in which the natives place their mail to be picked up sent to the boat. This cover is dated Nov. 24, 1968 and was placed aboard one the Matson Lines ship.

It is an interesting country to collect and provide you with beautiful covers.
