

They have 55 paid up members and the average attendance is about 30 per meeting. The highest attendance to any one meeting was 25 and the lowest 17. Out average attendance is about 27 with a high of 34. Their junior program is just getting started as is ours. They are limited in having stamp shows in their vicinity. There are only 2. One is in Wichita Falls, TEXOMA, with a half dozen dealers and the Lawton-Fort Sill Stamp Club show. NSSS is definitely more fortunate as we have access to many shows in the Sacramento Valley area and the Bay Area. When NEVPEX was running we had up to 20 dealers available. Maybe NEVPEX will be reinstated one of these years.

In the meantime there are several shows coming up in the next few months that NSSS members will have the chance to visit. 

Stamps tell stories to budding collectors

After 60 years of stamp collecting. George Costello considers himself an expert at trivia games.

Two years ago, Costello decided he could share what he's learned through his hobby with northern Nevada children and hopefully get them hooked on a pastime that's nota * - pular as it used to be.

p collecting can be a treasure trove of fun, history and even money for college, "Costello said. Two years ago, Costello and the

Nevada Stamp Study Society de-

cided to try an after-school stampeollecting club. Costello, vice president of the club, began the program at Dayton Middle School, but found the kids there were too old to become interested in the hobby.

After doing research with the U.S. Postal Service for a year, the group decided to target children ages 6 to 9. Last year the group tried monthly meetings at five elementary schools. Finding it too cumbersome to coordinate, Costello decided to consolidate the meetings at Anderson Elementary School in southwest Reno.

'At first kids say, 'Stamp collect-

ing, what's that?' " Costello said. "But once they get into it, they

can't get enough. And they learn."
More than 200 students have expressed an interest after being introduced to the club, Costello said. The students learn how to gather stamps, how to use tools to mount and study them and how to determine a stamp's value.

But the club is more than just learning about the hobby.

"Each stamp tells a story," Costello said. "Stamps commemorate a person, place or event. We teach about history, leaders, Cinco de Mayo, Hitler and what a monster he was.

Pilar Barajas, 9, attended her first stamp club meeting last week and said she plans to continue.

"I like stamps. They have pretty pictures," she said as she fished through a pile of stamps to pull out one of the Virgin Mary holding a baby Jesus. "I like this one. It's Christmas.

Costello said he figures an afternoon spent learning about history science and geography is better than an afternoon in front of the television.

"It gives them an awareness," he said. "There is no downside to On a recent TV series "Biography", the main person was "Simon Wiesenthal,
-Nazi Hunter". He was a stamp collector and a letter sent to because he collected stamps
provided information, as to the location of the top Nazi war criminal, Adolf Eichtman, who was
wanted for running the crematoriums in Poland. His information was useful by the Israel people to
go after this man and catch him.

At the last meeting in August, the mini-auction was replaced with a consignment program. A member brought in his material with the price already posted on the sheet. The purchaser then paid the seller for his material and the seller paid 10% to the club. The items sold quite readily and the action was over with in a few minutes. If this type of selling and buying agrees with everyone this program will continue.

We had some nice reports on the APS Stampshow 98. It was too bad that many of us could not get the opportunity to visit it. Maybe next year. In the meantime there are several shows coming up in the next few months that NSSS members will have the chance to visit. Sacapex will be held on Nov. 7 & 8th in Sacramento at the Scottish Rite Temple. Sunpex will be held on Nov. 14 and 15th in Sunnyvale CA. PenPex will be held on Dec. 5 and 6th in Redwood City, CA. Scott No. 1131 was issued to commemorate the St. Lawrence Seaway. It is a 4 cent stamp designed to tie the U.S. and Canada together. On the left is the Canadian Maple Leaf and on the right is the U.S. Eagle. It is red and dark blue in color. It was issued on June 26, 1959. It was designed by Arnold Copeland, Ervine Metrzl, William H. Buckley and Gerald Trottier.

French explorers discovered the St. Lawrence River in 1535. They thought it would be a shipping lane to China. Later, it was discovered that it was a valuable route from the Atlantic ocean to the Great Lakes. However, it the river needed to be dredged and, as usual, the governments took 60 years to make the decision to do the dredging. Finally, in 1954 a corporation was formed to complete this project.

The seaway is 2300 miles of canals and locks going from the western end of Lake Superior to the St. Lawrence River. On June 26, 1958 Queen Elizabeth II and Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower dedicated the completed Seaway.

Canada's issue, No. 387 was found to have inverted centers. Catalogue value \$8,000. mint and \$6,250 used. So check your Canadian stamps.

What was the name of the corporation that was formed to complete the St. Lawrence Seaway project?

Did you notice in the news that the U.S.P.O. is issuing some new stamps for the 70's period. One will be the SMILEY FACE. Two black dots with a curved mouth, with yellow background and 33 cents value. Also, the recent issue of Alfred Hitchcock has a cutout of image in the upper left hand corner. This was not announced and it was up to us collectors to discover that it was a real cut out. This is the first time the face of a stamp has been cut as part of the design. The five Bright eyes stamps released on Aug. 20 have unique, hidden security images produced through process called Scrambled Indicia. The dog design features a dog bone and a dog house: the cat design has a paw and mouse: the parakeet, a bird cage: the hamster, an exercise wheel; and the fish design has bubbles coming out of the mouth. These images only become clear when viewed through a specially manufactured decoder lens. Have fun.
