

There was a recent Question to the Stamp Collector concerning collecting plate blocks. The question concerned the cutting of the block of stamps so a portion of the stamps around the block would be included with the block. This, supposedly, would prevent damage to the perforations to the outside stamps of the block. But, in the long run, when it became time to remove that selvage, for whatever reasons, the perforations, still, could be damaged. Many collectors regard that extra selvage unsightly and distracting to the block of stamps. In other words, forget it.

Revenues

What is it? The figures below shows a female posing next to a table. The back side of the photograph or playing card has a 2 cent Playing card revenue stamp attached to it.





The corners of the photograph or playing card has its corners neatly trimmed. The picture is somewhat like a photograph made by the old time photographer, with his head covered by a black cloth and peering into the plate glass surface. This was the made of focusing the camera. the camera is now focused and the inserts the glass negative into its holder. His head comes out of the black cape and he is now ready to take the picture. In his left or right hand is the flash powder holder. At this moment he tells the young lady to stand perfectly still. He squeezes the lens bulb to open the lens and his right thumb presses the igniter. There is a flash of light and a puff of smoke. He now lets go of the lens bulb and the scene is preserved.

The picture is developed and placed on a thin piece of card board or tin. This will be given or sold to someone to place in their scrapbook. Ah,, but, look, on the backside of the photo is a stamp. A revenue stamp for playing cards. This does not look like a playing card. Maybe it is a sample of the backside of all the playing in this pack.

The play card revenue stamp was first issued in 1862 with other revenue stamps. The Internal Revenue issued stamps for Express, Proprietary, Telegraphy, Bank Check, Certificates of Foreign Exchange, Inland Exchange, Bills of Lading, Contracts, Mortgages, Entry of Goods, Insurance, Life Insurance, Conveyance, Playing Cards and Agreements. These stamps brought revenue to the IR department. The stamp also showed the payment had been made for that particular subject. At first, the stamps could only be used for the purpose indicated on the face of the stamp. However, in December of 1862, the stamps, except for the Proprietary, could be used indiscriminately. At that time, there was a tax on photographs and this photograph was known as a "carte de visite." or French for calling card. So, guess what, the playing card revenue stamp was used to pay for the tax on these particular items.

The most important factor in determining a plate variety is finding a confirming copy. Once an identical copy of an item turns up (preferably more), the status of plate variety can be estab-

If all known copies bear no marginal markings or are not part of identifiable multiples, it may take some time to determine a stamp's original printing location.

Ten years ago, when the illustrated \$3.60 face value souvemir sheet was released during World Stamp Expo 89 in Washington, D.C. (Nov. 17, 1989), few collectors thought it would become a premium item in a short period of time.

U.S. Air Mail began in 1918. There were many short hops between the cities of the East coast. The pilots were a brave lot as they faced poor landing fields, bad weather and not too reliable equipment. It was an adventure for them and these men meet the challange of the day. Eventually a coast to coast route was developed in 1926. Reno was one of the stops on this cross contenental route. The following cover was issued on May 15, 1968 commemorating the 50th anniversary of Air Mail.

Many first day covers are issued honoring many people and their accomplishments. At times the accomplishments are honored on the stamps and not the individual. Collecting covers provides more information about the subject on the stamp than the stamp itself provides to the collector. Also, the cachet and its maker. Some cachet makers are more desirable than others and this is another branch of collecting.

The cover on the next page was made by Art Craft. Art Craft provides FDC's for all the stamps issued by the Post Office since the 1939 World's Fair stamp. They do make nice looking covers.
