Canada plans to raise the Postal rates in the year 2002. The domestic rate will raise from 47 to 48 cents. This, believe it or not, rate is lower than the U.S. rate of 32 cents for domestic mail.

National Stamp Collecting Month is still actively working in spite of the budget cuts coming up. October will be the NSCM as it has been in the past. The 34 cent version of Porky Pig Looney Tunes will be the subject. The stamp will be released on Oct. 1.

# **Stamp Albums**

There are several programs available for those with computers, which will help to design your pages and keep track of your collection and its value.

Which ever way you store your collection, keep the damage to the utmost minimum.

## Voice of America

We have all heard about the Voice of America broadcasts for quite a while, now. Here is some information about this interesting form of dispersing news through out the world.

The Voice of America was depicted on beautiful stamp on Aug. 1967. It represented the 25th anniversary of this organization.

Programs are developed in Washington, D.C. These are sent to the transmitter station in Delano, CA. This station has 1 square mile of various sizes and shapes of antennae. By using an automatic switching arrangement the broadcasts can be directed to countries all over the world. Also, there is a 50ft dish for transmitting TV signals as far away as Taiwan. This part of the program was put on hold indefinitely.


The FDC cover of the V of A stamp was autographed by Mr. Jules Wenglard. Jules worked at the V of A, in Delano, for 15 years as one it's top engineers.

Among the great accomplishments that Mr. Wenglare, in his life time, he was responsible for establishing communication dialog between Gen. MacArthur and the Japanese.

When the U.S. Army could not contact the Japanese through the various radio frequencies, they came to the U.S.Air Force. Jules was in charge of all the weather frequencies for the U.S.A.F. It was known the Japanese monitored these frequencies. So, Jules had the message sent over these weather frequencies. Within one hour the Japanese contacted Gen. MacArthur and thus began the dialog for the conditions of surrender by the Japanese.
