The Twelve Days of Christmas have some hidden meanings. The set of stamps issued by Guensey as shown below with the hidden meanings following.

The "true love" mentioned in the song doesn't refer to an earthly suitor, it refers to God Himself. The "me" who receives the present refers to every baptized person.



The partridge in a pear tree is Jesus Christ, the Son of God. In the song, Christ is symbolically presented as a mother partridge which feigns injury to decoy predators from her helpless nestlings, much in memory of the expression of Christ's sadness over the fate of Jerusalem: "Jerusalem! Jerusalem! How often would I have sheltered thee under my wings, as a hen does her chicks, but thou wouldst not have it so..." The other symbols are said to mean the following.



The 2nd Day-2 Turtle doves: The Old and New Testaments.



The 3rd Day-3 French Hens: Faith, Hope and Charity.



Gospels and/or the Four Evangelists.



The 5th Day-5 Golden Rings: The first Five books of the Old Testament, which gives the history of man's fall from grace.



The 6th Day-6 Geese A-laying: the six days of creation.



The 7th Day-7 Swans A-swimming: the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit, the seven sacraments.



The 8th Day-8 Maids A-milking: the seven beatitudes.



The 9th Day-9 Drummers Drumming: the nine Fruits of the Holy Spirit.



The 10th Day-10 Pipers piping" the ten commandments.



The 11th Day-11 Ladies Dancing: the eleven faithful apostles.



The 12th Day-12 Lords A-Leaping: the twelve points of doctrine in the Apostle' Creed.

This interpretation of these 12 portraits of the 12 Days of Christmas is flexible and generally can be adapted by any Religious belief.

However, as history tells us, it reflects the view of the Catholic Church located in England. English Catholics was an underground church and the "Twelve Days of Christmas" was written to help the youth learn their faith, in an hidden way, by song.

I do not know the author of this article or where the information about this set of stamps was originated. It does show an interesting historical side of the subjects portrayed on the stamps. It provided me with information which I did not know about. Hope it did the same for you.

Here are a couple of cookie receipes Elna would like to submit for your pleasure.

Chocalate Chip Crunch Cookies

preheat oven to 375 de. rack in middle postion.

1 cup butter (2 sticks melted)

1 cup white sugar

1 cup brown sugar

2 teaspoons baking soda

1 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons vanilla

2 beaten eggs( may use fork)

2 1/2 cups flour(not sifted)

2 cups crushed corn flakes ( just crush them with your hands)

1-2 cups chocolate chips

Melt butter, add the sugars and stir. Add soda, salt, vanilla, and beaten eggs. Mix well. Then add flour and stir it in. Add crushed corn flakes and chocolate chips and mix it all thoroughly.

Form dough into walnut-size balls with your fingers and place on a greased cookie sheet. 12 to a standard sheet. Press them down with a floured or greased fork in a crisscross pattern (the same method as peanut butter cookies.)

Bake at 375 degrees for 10 minutes. Cool on cookie sheet for 2 minutes, then remove to a wire rack until they're completely cool. (the rack is important—it makes them crisp)

Black and Whites

Do not preheat oven yet--dough must chill before baking.

2 cups chocolate chips.

1/4 cup butter(1 1/2 sticks)

2 cups brown sugar(or white sugar with a scant 2 tablespoons molasses mixed in)

4 eggs

2 teaspoons vanilla

2 teaspoons baking soda

1 teaspoon salt

2 cups flour ( not sifted)

approx. 1/2 confextioners'

sugar(powdered sugar) in a small bowl.

Melt chocolate chips with butter ( microwave on high power for 2 minutes, then stir until smooth.

Mix in sugar and let cool. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Mix in vanilla, baking powder and salt. Add flour and mix well.

Chill dough for at lease 4 hours (overnight is even better)

When you're ready to bake, preheat oven to 350 degrees, rack in middle position.

Roll walnut-sized dough balls with your hands(messy-wear plastic gloves if you wish) Drop the dough balls into a bowl with the powdered sugar and roll them around until they're coated. (if the dough gets too warm, stick it back in the refrigerator until you can handle it again.)

Place the balls on a greased cookie sheet, 12 to a standard sheet. (they will flatten when they bake.) Bake at 350 degrees for 12-14 minutes. Let them cool on the cookie sheet for 2 minutes and then remove to wire rack to finish cooling.
