


Glendale Park

Most of have a few Confederate stamps in our collection. How many of these might be a fake, forgery or even a "facsimile". Most facsimiles are so marked, so they're easy to tell. The forgeries were meant to fool the Post Office or collectors and might be a little harder to detect. Help is on your computer at a site called "Counterfeits and Fakes of Confederate Stamps".

Counterfeits and Fakes of Confederate Stamps

This site features counterfeits and fakes of Confederate stamps. If you are unfamiliar with philatelic terminology, look here.

A detailed page is provided for each counterfeit that points out some of the characteristics that can be used to identify the counterfeit. Since many counterfeits have fake cancels applied, as many characteristics as possible are displayed. Characteristics that can be easily used when looking at computer scans are marked with a red star.

Note by the first sentence that even the uninitiated can find some information on this site to help them determine which is real and which is not.

This particular stamp is displayed on the site. It is the real stamp. To find out about the fake, just click on the image. It will take you to a different page that will show all the fakes known.



If you decide you have a fake, click on the image that is closest to your stamp and up pops a new image that points out all of the characteristics and differences of the forgery.

This stamp, CSA #1, has six different forgeries, three of them by known forgers. Most of the fakes are easy to spot once you know what the original looks like. It is shown on the same page as the fakes for comparison. The colors on the site aren't true to the stamp, after all, it's only a computer, but the images offer enough detail to spot the difference.

This site has much more to offer. Each stamp, and all the Confederates are listed, is detailed with information such as how many were printed, who designed it and earliest known first use. There is a separate page for several of the Provisionals and their counterfeits, a "Current Reference Items" page, a chat room and the usual links to CSA and Forgeries pages. All-in-all, a pretty good site to find out if your Confederate stamps are real.

Staying within the good 'ole USA again. This will be a breeze for you specialists (oh m'God, that would be all of us) in American Postal issues, so sit outside on the porch with a cool glass of Lipton's iced tea, but come inside to the air conditioning to do this quiz. That's the American way.

Away from the Isles and back to the Continent where we know our own stamps best. I note, however, a lot of good answers to the last quiz. Hope you've done as well on this one. Here are the answers.

- 1. A. Quilt making. The American Folk Art issues, #1745-48, sold on March 8th and designed by Christopher Pullman.
- 2. B. Skiing. # C 85 shows a series of stylized skiers in five different colors. Issued for the 11th Winter games in Sapporo, Japan.
- 3. B. Soyuz, celebrating the Appollo- Soyuz link up in space. The stamp was designed by Russian and American designers, Anatoli M. Aksamit and Robert McCall. # 1569 and 70
- 4. A. Whooping Cranes. # 1098, issued on November 22.
- 5. B. Five. #1742a, issued on February 7th, 1980.
- 6. C. One, three, four and four cents. #1113 16. The four cent sepia showing the Lincoln-Douglas debate was issued on August 27, 1958 while the others followed in 1959 on Feb 12 and 27 and May 30.
- 7. A Jane Addams. # 878 was one of only three women honored in that series of thirty five stamps.
- 8. C. China Clipper. # C21 was issued to pay the cost of postage used on the Transpacific Airmail service which started on November 22nd of that year.
- 9. C. 1959. #1124 was issued on February 14 to commemorate the one hundredth year of Oregon's statehood.
- 10. A. Alexander Hamilton. It was his battery shown on # 629 commemorating the battle of White Plains, New York one hundred and fifty years before.

Number five, which had the same answer gave me fits and starts until I found out thee is a special section in the Specialized edition of Scotts just for booklet panes. It doesn't give much information about the windmills depicted. You'll just have to look closer at the stamps to find out what they are.
