1775-1993 Domestic Rates For Letters And Postcards

Prior to the middle of the 19th century, rates were based on the number of sheets in a letter and the distance it was traveling. In 1845, rates were based on the weight of a letter and the distance it was going. Beginning in 1863, domestic letter rates became "uniform," that is, they were based solely on weight, regardless of distance.

You'll notice, there are only two times in American history that postal rates have dropped. The first time in 1883. The second time was at the end of the "Great War" in 1919.

Many of you got all the answers correct in this quiz but a few missed the biggest clue or just didn't believe it was real. That's okay, though, because you still did well. I'm glad to see the response to these quizzes are bigger than I had anticipated. Lots of members earning auction bucks for the big auction next month. So, how did you do this month?

- 1. B. Scott # 807 reveals to us that the purple critter features our third president, Thomas Jefferson on the three cent issue.
- 2. B. Tom Sawyer is whitewashing the famous fence in Mark Twain's novel, "Huckleberry Finn", painted by Norman Rockwell, is the boy on the stamp. # 1470.
- 3. B. Six stamps with quotations from George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, Francis Scott Key and Patrick Henry. #'s 1139 to 1144.
- 4. B. Robert H. Goddard is shown with an Atlas rocket launching in the background on Scott # C 69. It was issued on the 82nd anniversary of his birth on October 5,1882.
- 5. B. # 1448 honors Nicholaus Copernicus, said to be the father of modern astronomy. Issued on his birthday, April, 23.
- 6. B. Parcel postage due (not to be confused with parcel post), were all printed in green ink. #'s JQ 1 thru JQ 5 were at the same time as parcel post and were allowed to be used as postage.
- 7. B. Of course you remembered the Famous American Series was issued in 1940 so this wasn't too hard to look up and identify John J. Audubon on # 874.
- 8. B. You'll have to look in the "Phillipines under US Administration" to find this one. It's Scott # 382, basketball pictured along with baseball (# 380) and Tennis (# 381)
- 9. B. One might expect to find this in the airmail section of the catalog, but it is with the regular issues. # 1341 was issued to cover postage for airlift services of parcels to servicemen overseas. It was, of course, good for all postal services. It is the eagle that adorns the stamp's surface.
- 10. B. Christmas Seals were first introduce to the American public in 1907 by the American National Red Cross (# CS 1). Denmark had them in 1904, created by Einar Holboell, an employee of the Danish Post office.
