
The show saw an attendance of 175 to 200 people. It cost \$3,390.00 to put the show on and brought \$4,075 to the club for a profit of \$685.00. All of the dealers that were at the show said they would be willing to return next year. Sounds like they did pretty well. There were 16 exhibitors at the show with a total of 42 frames. Two of the exhibitors were judges and 4 more were in the Junior competition. Dick Dreiling said he was pleased by the number of exhibits and it was the best show he has seen in years. We're all glad to see more people willing to exhibit.

A number of suggestions were made for the junior area of the show, such as introducing stamp games that might be played with the dealers to get the kids interested. Taking some of the frames from the shows to the schools may bring the kids to the shows. More advertising at the schools, emphasizing the educational aspects of stamp collecting could be helpful for both, the show and the hobby.

This coming show may require the participation of a few more members. Someone will need to proof read the advertising flyers and the programs. This one neglected to mention the NSSS. Its an easy oversight to make, but with a little back-up these things can be caught. We might need a little extra information in the programs, for instance, more about the Junior program. Let's not forget anyone with a little experience may wish to help creating a media package.

Considering the lack of media coverage, the show was quite successful and very nicely presented. Be sure to attend the next meeting. We need your participation to make decisions for next year.

This month is a tip of the hat to the Topical collector. The site was created by Colin Rose, a mathematician who has written a book or two, several articles and has taught a few classes, all in mathematics not stamps. Stamps are his joy not his job and a darn fine job he has done on this stamp site.

The picture above opens the first page of this site. Each country name is a link to pictures of chess on the stamps of that country. The oldest is from Bulgaria, issued in 1947. There is also a catalog created by "Rose" (I assume it is Colin Rose) in which you can look up chess stamps according to the year they were issued, the country in which they were issued, the players honored or the tournament that is celebrated. The listings include stamp values as well as the catalog numbers from Scott, SG, Rose and Michel. There is also a link to a site where you can purchase the Domfil catalog.

Did you know that all stamps that were printed in Afghanistan after 1989 were fraudulent? Even those listed in Scott according to a link that is copyrighted by "Illegal Stamps". The link, of course, is found on this site. Other links will take you to the Wax Museum of Illegal Stamps and the famous UPU Illegal Stamps List.

There is also a section called the "Archives" which is really a set of links to several rather interesting sites about chess on stamps, most of which are in English, including one that is written with a Russian accent (you'll have to read it yourself). There's lots of information about covers, errors and history. Each page has numerous links to many more pages that are related to chess, and chess on stamps. The next section contains links to several Societies and journals on the web. Most of these are not in English. How's your Nederlandish?

The next paragraph contains an address you can write to for album pages. Below is the copy as it appear on the website. All in all, this may prove to be a useful site for the topical collector who collects chess on stamps. For the links if nothing else. Brandon?

- 2. C. There were thirteen stamps issued to honor those countries overrun by the Axis and the Japanese during World War Two. They are #'s 909 to 921. Due to secrecy by the printers, there are many errors in this issue that are not mentioned in Scott. The exception, of course, is the famous "Korpa" issue.
- 3. A. John Tyler, famous for running on the "Tippee canoe and Tyler too" platform. #815.
- 4. A. One cent, #889, in the inventors part of the "Famous Americans" issue.
- 5. B. # 934 honors the achievements of the US Army during World War Two, the liberation of Paris.
- 6. B. 1940. Another in the "Famous Americans" series. You can see his work on the modern gold coins. #886.
- 7. A. #1375 commorates the 150th anniversary of the statehood of Alabama with it's state flower and bird (the Yellow-shafted Flicker).
- 8. C. Rose-carmine is the color of #870, the two cent issue in the American Educators portion of the "Famous American" series.
- 9. A. # 833 honors our 29th president who died in office in 1923 of a heart attack. He was helpful in recovering from a post World War One economic depression and presided over the "Teapot Dome Scandal".
- 10. C. 1915. The first issue was a Washington-Franklin, #449 (Washington, type I), printed on December 5, 1915

Had to search the book a little for number 10, didn't you. I got lucky and opened right up to that page. But, since I already know the answers, it's easy to get lucky. Hoping you all had good answers.
