

Counterfeit U. S. Stamps By John Walter

Our stamp club recently purchased the *Scott Specialized Catalogue of United States Counterfeits 2023*. The 97-page catalogue covers postage issues from 1895 into 2022 (denominated and forever), semi-postal, airmail, postal cards, plus nonpostal and revenue counterfeits.

The catalogue is in the club library and can be signed out for two weeks. Contact **Dave Gehringer** to arrange the sign-out.

Quoting from the catalogue, "Counterfeiting of United States forever stamps increased exponentially in 2021 with most new issues being faked. Scott catalog editors have noted within the Postage section of the Scott Specialized Catalogue of United States Stamps and Covers what stamp issues are known to exist as counterfeits and have placed that information in footnotes.




"Because of the large number of new forever counterfeits stamps (**more than 300 major numbers in the last year**), Scott editors have decided to only list denominated and earlier counterfeits in the 2023 *Scott U.S. Specialized*."

With the proliferation of these counterfeit stamps, mainly printed and produced in China, you may ask "What is the USPS doing about the problem?"

The USPS and Postal Inspectors are fighting back against counterfeit postage. With new changes to the Domestic Mail Manual, items mailed with counterfeit postage will be considered abandoned and are subject to being opened and disposed of at the Postal Service's discretion. How easy is it to "purchase" counterfeit stamps? Pretty easy with a simple Internet search which I recently did. Most of the fake and counterfeit stamps are advertised in panes of 20 and rolls of 100 for prices from about \$25 to \$30. Most frequently counterfeited stamps are the flag issues. Below are recent images from the Internet advertising these "stamps."

From the U.S. Postal Inspectors Service:

WASHINGTON -- In recent years, a surge in the use of counterfeit postage has been found in the mail stream. The intentional use, or sale, of counterfeit postage is a crime because it seeks to obtain services without payment. This activity reflects an intentional effort to defraud the Postal Service of the funds it needs to provide services to the public.

In response to this problem, the Postal Service is filing a federal register notice about changes to the *Mailing Standards of the United States Postal Service*, Domestic Mail Manual (DMM®), that will allow the Postal Service to treat items found in the mail stream bearing counterfeit postage as abandoned. "As the most trusted government agency in the nation, we will continue to work together with other law enforcement and government agencies to protect the sanctity of the mail," said Chief Postal Inspector Gary Barksdale.

The Postal Service's proposed changes will provide the public notice of the handling of items bearing counterfeit postage. Under the revision to DMM 604.8.4, articles found in the mails with counterfeit postage will be considered abandoned and may be opened and disposed of at the Postal Service's discretion. The mission of the Postal Service and the Postal Inspection Service is to ensure the safety, security, and integrity of the U.S. Mail. The implementation of these new regulations will continue to support and enhance this mission.

Counterfeit postage is any marking or indicia that has been made, printed, or otherwise created without authorization from the Postal Service that is printed or applied, or otherwise affixed, on an article placed in the mails that indicates or represents that valid postage has been paid to mail the article. Consumers purchasing online items may be surprised to find out that the vendor mailed their goods using counterfeit postage. Under the new regulations, such items will be considered abandoned and disposed.

The Wrangle Government By Dave Parsons

Baron Peter von Wrangel; (August 27, 1878 – April 25, 1928), also known by his nickname the **Black Baron**, was a Russian officer of Baltic German origin in the Imperial Russian Army. During the final phase of the Russian Civil War, he was commanding general of the anti-Bolshevik White Army in Southern Russia. Being the last hope of "Old Russia" he and his Cossack troops were the remaining core of the Czar's army. France recognized his government as the official government of Russia from 1919-1921. Being driven by revolutionary forces to the sea, Wrangel organized a mass evacuation on the shores of the Black Sea evacuating the White forces from the Crimea in 1920 where Allied warships rescued them and took them to Constantinople. The Wrangel Government continued to exist there for a few months longer.

While interred in Turkey and Serbia, the exiled government turned to creating postage stamps. They could not afford to create their own plates but took stamps from Russia, Ukraine, and Russian Offices in Turkey, applied surcharges to them and issued them in 1921. These were the stamps of the Wrangle Government. The stamps bore the surcharge meaning "Post of the Russian Army". They were to be used for communications between the refugees, however, these folks could not afford postage or know how to contact friends or relatives so used copies are seldom found. Few were sold to the public and reprints are common.




These stamps may be found listed in Scott Catalog under Russia Offices abroad- Offices in the Turkish Empire. They were picked up as a Raffle Prize at a recent club meeting and provide a glimpse into a period of history unfamiliar to the author.

Port Tobacco Maryland 1884 By Tom Reyman

The Chesapeake Bay divides the eastern portion of Maryland into what are termed the Eastern Shore and Western shore of the state. This area has some of the earliest settlements in the United States dating to the 1600's. Some features that made this area so popular was the closeness to the fishing in the Bay and the many inlets that provided shelter for people and boats. The proximity to the Bay enhanced the use of boats to develop commercial shipping locally and to overseas ports.

The subject cover was one that was sent from the town of Salisbury on the Eastern Shore to Port Tobacco on the Western Shore. The year of the mailing is unknown, but the stamp (Scott number 210) was issued on October 1, 1883. The stamp was issued to cover the postage for the new rate of two cents for one-half ounce mailings. Since the letter was sent on March 29, the earliest year date would have been 1884.




The village of Port Tobacco was a seaport with ready access to the Bay and to the Atlantic Ocean. This location helped the village grow rapidly during the 1700's and it became the second largest community in Maryland and became the county seat of Charles County.

In the mid- 1800's, the inlet to the village became shallow because of river silting and the railroad line that was built in the area bypassed the village in 1873. The result was the decline in commercial traffic and, with it, the decline in population. The county seat was moved to a different village in 1895 as the population decreased to fewer than 100 residents.

Residents of Port Tobacco were very much involved with the early years of the country before and after the Revolutionary War. Some notable people from Port Tobacco were John Hanson, the first President of the Continental Congress, and Thomas Stone, a signer of the Declaration of Independence.

During the U.S. Civil War, Port Tobacco was strongly sympathetic to the Confederate cause and several Confederate spies lived in the area.

The sender of the mailing was a merchant, A. Parker, from the town of Salisbury on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. Salisbury is situated along the banks of the Wicomico River which aided its growth as a commercial shipping center. During the Civil War Union troops used the town as an operation center to intercept shipments of contraband materials to the Confederate troops in the vicinity.

It is likely that in 1884 when the mailing was sent to Port Tobacco, that the mail travelled by ship from Salisbury.
