**Sept. 9 meeting –** The attendance was 23 including 3 members via Zoom. **Erik Fields** and **James Steckley** arrived early to set up the meeting room. **Eric Moody** provided the refreshments.

**James Steckley** made announcements about USPS new stamp issues and British Empire Stamp Society presentations via Zoom. There are 15 albums donated mostly with covers. They will be in the October online auction.

**John Walter** discussed the current issue of the Post Boy and status of the website. The Vassar post office Sept. display consisted of material for the Reno Hot Air Ballon Races and the Reno National Air Races.

The raffle was conducted by **George Ray** with 10 prizes and a bonus prize won by **Dave Gehringer**. The money of \$6.00 was won by **Eric Moody**.

The live auction had 66 lots with 53 lots selling for \$253.25. **Gary Atkinson** was the auctioneer with **Nadiah Beekun** and **Howard Kadohiro** helping.


**Mike Potter** announced paid membership of 54 with about 10 members yet to pay for 2023-24 membership. He will contact those members again about renewing.

The program was a slide presentation on "Victory in Vietnam Covers" by **John Walter**. He purchased 10 of these covers at the Reno Stamp Show in July. To his surprise they were "famous" fake navy cancel covers supposedly from ships stationed off the Vietnam coast during the war. All the covers were produced by Fred Karcher, many addressed to his homes in PA and MA. Great presentation with lots of interesting information about the ships. The covers were on display at the meeting on a poster board.

## An Unusual First Day Cover By Howard Grenzebach

First day covers have been collectibles for many years and are reasonably common. This one is a little different. It was sent to the Chairman of the Board of the First National Bank in Chicago. It was sent by Roy North, the Third Assistant Postmaster General whose duties at the time included selecting the designs to be used on postage stamps.



The stamp was issued on June 22, 1943. It shows the Polish flag, the flag of the first country to be overrun by the German army at the onset of World War II. It was also the first stamp of the "Overrun Countries" series. And the autograph on the side of the envelope? It is from the Polish (government in exile) Ambassador to America, Jan Ciechanowski.

Here is a copy of the enclosed letter:

## THE DEPUTY THIRD ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL WASHINGTON

June 22, 1943.

Mr. John P. Oleson, Chairman of the Board, First National Bank, Chicago, Illinois.

My dear Mr. Oleson:

The stamp on this letter, honoring the courage and valor of the Polish people, is the first in a series of postage stamps to be issued paying tribute to the overrun and occupied countries of Europe.

This is the first time that a postage stamp has been issued by this Government bearing a foreign flag as the central subject. To the right of the flag appears the "Phoenix," a mythological bird, signifying renewal of life; to the left is a figure of a kneeling woman with shackles falling from outstretched arms, symbolizing liberation.

It is a pleasure for me to send this first day cover to you.

Postmaster General Frank C. Walker, the Ambassador of Poland, Mr. Jan Ciechanowski, and the Deputy Third Assistant Postmaster General, Mr. Roy M. North, took part today in ceremonies in Chicago and Washington on the occasion of the first sales of the new five-cent stamp in honor of Poland. The stamp is the first of a series paying tribute to the overrun and occupied countries for their resistance to Nazi aggression.

In Chicago, Mr. Walker made a brief address (the text of which has been made public) in tribute to Poland, in connection with the sale of the first sheet of the new stamps there. Philatelic societies conducted ceremonies in the main lobby of the post office. Demand for the new stamps was so heavy that Chicago was forced to order a second million when the first million was near exhaustion.

At the Washington Post Office, Ambassador Ciechanowski received the first sheet of the Poland stamp sold at that office, presented to him by Mr. North, whose Bureau is in charge of stamp issues. At the presentation ceremony in the post office, the Ambassador made public the following cable which he had received from Poland's Finance Minister Strasburger, who is also in charge of Poland's postal and telegraph services:

As Minister acting for Polish posts and telegraph, request you kindly to transmit to United States postal authorities the deep-felt thanks of the Polish Government for their friendly gesture in issuing a Polish postal stamp. The Polish people welcome this manifestation as yet another evidence of America's great friendliness to Poland and also as an expression of the inexorable desire to build the future world on the basis of justice and equality which form the framework of American ideals."



The following is the second page of the First Day cermony program:

Mr. North's statement on presenting the sheet of stamps to

the Ambassador follows:

"Mr. Ambassador:

"Of all the countries in Europe that have been subjected to the wrath of the Axis aggressor, none has suffered more grievously than your native land which, at great odds, has given unstintingly of its life blood in resisting the forces whose objective is to destroy and enslave.

"The special issue of postage stamps which we are placing on sale today will carry a message of encouragement and hope from America to your countrymen that the shackles of oppression are about to be broken and from the ashes of destruction Poland will arise again to take its place among the Nations of the World.

"Your Excellency, I count it one of the highest honors that has come to me to have the privilege of presenting to you the first sheet of Poland stamps offered for sale through the Washington, D. C. post office on this date."

The reply of the Ambassador of Poland follows:

"It is most gratifying for the Polish Government and the Polish Nation that Poland has been chosen as first in the series of those countries in honor of which the Postmaster General of the United States is issuing special stamps.

"The Polish people will interpret this gesture, so friendly to my country, as a recognition that Poland was the first to take up arms against wanton aggression and imperialism, and in defense of the principles which the United Nations have inscribed upon their banner.

"It will serve as a precious encouragement to the people of Poland in their indomitable resistance to the invader.

"On behalf of the Polish Government and the Polish Nation, and in my own behalf, I wish to express the varmest gratitude for this new proof of American understanding and friendship."

## The Giant Forest, CA Post Office By Patrick Crosby

Sister writes this postcard and mails it at the Giant Forest, CA, post office saying "...some very large trees." Well, Yea! How about the most massive tree species in the world – the giant sequoia! And how about right there in Giant Forest the largest living thing in the world – the General Sherman tree!

I saw the featured postcard online and checked "Giant Forest, CA" to see if it was a DPO (discontinued post office). Sure, enough it is, with a couple of post office dating sources showing the office was only open 1915-1918, making

it a fairly scarce postmark. But this postcard shows a 1924 four-bars handstamp. Contemporary U.S. Postal Bulletins show the post office name was changed from Giant Forest, CA, to Sequoia National Park, CA, effective April 16, 1927. They also show the post office opening most years on June 1st and closing on September 30th. In the off season any remaining mail was transferred 40 miles down the Sierra west slope to the Lemoncove (also Lemon Cove), CA, post office. During seasonal operations there was a Star Route Service contractor who transported the mail between Giant Forest and Lemoncove. For example, E.L. Haskin was contracted for: both ways, 6 days a week, from July 1, 1922, to June 30, 1926 at \$1260 per annum. He was paid extra for large weight amounts and would have carried this post card.

The Giant Forest name refers to 1,880 acres inside Sequoia National Park which host easy access to giant sequoia tree groves and includes 40 miles of hiking trails. At one time there were 300 buildings in this favorite visitor area. But it was determined all the commercial activity was detrimental to the long-term health of the trees. Now the Giant Forest is a day use area with only 4 buildings.






It seems the sender picked up this hand-colored card of the Kern River before driving up into the Sierras and Sequoia National Park.



The Giant Forest post office was previously named Ranger, CA, established in March 1907, with the name changed to Giant Forest, CA, on December 23, 1915.



The Giant Forest coffee shop and post office. Also stores, a lodge and many cabins were once all together for the convenience of visitors.

Between the years 1995 and 2000 earlier buildings were demolished with accommodations and other commercial activity moving to Giant Forest Village Camp Kaweah Historic District just to the west, then the accommodations again to Wuksachi Village 7 miles north. The post office, still named Sequoia National Park, CA, moved to Lodgepole Village about 5 miles north.

## **Carson City Library Display**


To celebrate National Stamp Collecting Month, **John Walter** and **Dave Gehringer** put together a philatelic display at the Carson City Library. They made full use of the large display case using stamps, covers, maximum cards, postal history items, philatelic books and magazines. On the bottom shelve is a nice display of the Tools of the Hobby. Scattered on the shelves are some colorful first day covers.

To draw kids to the display, the bottom area has material on Animals on Stamps, the Art of Disney, Cartoon Characters, and Super Heroes. The top shelve has postal history covers from sailors and soldiers writing home during WWII and the Vietnam War. A new display board has nice engraved cachets of the first eight U.S. presidents on covers and maximum cards. Nevada Day is also represented with stamps and covers from the state.



## Vassar Post Office Display for October By John Walter

The two display frames at the main Reno post office have new material celebrating Nevada Day on October 31 (anniversary of statehood in 1864) and National Stamp Collecting Month.





**John Walter** visits the Vassar post office every 4-6 weeks to make sure fresh material is in the display frames. Six 8½" x 11" pages fix nicely in a frame. This is the first time larger pages with commemorative stamps were used. Four of these larger pages fit the frame. Have to remember that for future displays.
