The audio-visual equipment was set up by **John Walter**.


President **James Steckley** had comments on the cost of mailing a postcard in Denmark at \$7.30. He had some information with newspaper clippings about Key West, FL. James was stationed in Key West while serving in the U.S. Coast Guard. U.S. Route 1 starts at Key West and is 113 miles to the Florida mainland over 44 bridges. It is the longest noth-south highway in the U.S. at 2,377 miles ending in North Kent, Maine.

Show Cair **Erik Fields** reported the National Bowling Stadium venue was reconfirmed for July 26-27. He is selling previous stamp show covers for 50ϕ each. They are available at regular meetings.

George Ray sold raffle tickets 3 for a dollar. **John Walter** was a big winner with 2 raffles prizes, the Bonus prize and the money drawing of \$12.50.

A Pioneer Holidays Greeting Card By Patrick Crosby




A colorful view of Broadway in New York City by publisher Ed Lowey is from the Classic Pioneer postcard period (May 1, 1893, to May 17, 1898). It was one of 17 views, mostly of New York City, in his "Souvenir of New York" series and was printed on both private postcards and government postal cards.

Later "Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year" was printed on some of the cards to boost sales during the holiday season. The card shown (Friedman P#13811) was mailed to Germany, postmarked Dec. 21, 1897.

In April 1886, the Universal Postal Union (UPU), which the United States was a member, decided that member government issued postal cards were to have the wordings (or similar) "Carte Postale", and "Universal Postal Union" to receive a reduced international postage rate.

At the time a ½ oz. letter was 5¢ and postal cards were 2¢ (equivalent to 25 French centimes and 10 centimes respectively). Not until June 1897, did these requirements apply to private postcards to the dismay of publishers like Ed Lowey whose supply of cards (probably made in Germany) did not have the proper inscriptions. To get around this requirement, publishers sometimes added "Printed Matter" to take advantage of the 1¢ international printed matter rate enjoyed by newspapers and others. However, if there was any written correspondence the letter rate applied, as in this case.

The UPU had decided in 1879 to adopt a stamp color scheme for the basic postage rates: 1¢ green, 2¢ red, 5¢ blue. Many smaller UPU member countries complied, but some large countries, like the United States, did not. When the UPU delegates convened in Washington, DC in May and June 1897, some smaller countries shamed the laggards into eventual compliance.



The post card was postmarked Dec. 21, 1897, in New York. It has a receiving postmark of Dec. 31, 1897 at Crefeld, Germany.

The featured card with its correspondence has a 5¢ chocolate Grant stamp (Scott 255 or 270 if watermarked). The USPOD did not have a blue 5¢ stamp until March 1898 - the same design in blue (Sc. 281). At this time blue 1¢ stamps changed to green, with other color changes as necessary.

2024 Poinsettia Postage Label



The United States Postal Service will feature an image of a poinsettia on its computer-vended postage label for the Christmas holiday season.

The image is from one of the four Holiday Joy forever stamps issued Sept. 14 in a double-sided pane of 20.

In the artwork for the postage label, the image of the poinsettia is rotated 90 degrees.

The postage labels are dispensed at self-service kiosks installed in many post offices across the country. Post offices tend to load the preprinted holiday postage labels at different times, and this year they will be available starting in mid-November.

The U.S. Postal Service created its first full-color holiday-themed computer-vended postage labels in 2012. Except for 2019, the labels have been issued annually sometime between mid-October and mid-November.

Collectors interested in obtaining the new postage label can look online for a post office location that has a self-service kiosk. Visit https://tools.usps.com/find-location.htm and under "Location Types," click the down arrow and select "Self-Service Kiosks" from the drop-down menu.

When I did the search, I found five post offices in the Reno-Sparks area: main post office on Vassar St, 1580 Grand Point Way (Peavine), 75 McCabe Dr (Steamboat), and in Sparks; 750 4th St., and 2929 Vista Blvd.

The postage labels vended by the kiosks are listed as computer-vended postage stamps in the <u>Scott Specialized Catalogue of United States Stamps and Covers</u>.

If you receive these Poinsettia labels on your Christmas mail, they are worth saving the entire cover. The quantity printed is not great compared to the mass printed stamps. A postmark cancel may not always appear on the cover as the gray area on the label is a barcode that acts as the cancel control.

On the right is the Holiday Joy block of 4 issued on Sept. 14. The Poinsettia stamp is on the lower left and rotated 90 degrees for the image on the postage label.




Vassar Post Office Display
